Having served 16 years already, I am running again to make the world a better place for my kids: to improve public schools; to protect the environment and slow carbon pollution; to reduce gun violence; to combat and deconstruct systemic racism; and to fix our tax system.

What are your most significant accomplishments on environment and climate change?

This past session, I sponsored SB 5528, which will help Seattle and other jurisdictions tax themselves to build more transit, faster. I have co-sponsored every major piece of environmental legislation for many years.

I have worked closely with groups from Washington Conservation Voters and the Sierra Club to Seattle Subway and Climate Solutions to protect the environment from a variety of threats.

As majority floor leader, I will be in a position to help a range of environmental priorities advance. I am particularly interested in policies that promote urban density, including support for transit and growth management.
