Why are you running for this position? What in your background has led you to run? (Not to exceed 150 words)

During the pandemic I founded We Heart Seattle that since has become a civic engagement movement that through action builds community. This action has clocked 14,000 hours of volunteer work removing 1.3 M LBS of trash, 40,000 needles and various hazardous waste from our greenspaces. This work has revealed a tsunami of failed policy and wasted tax money on ineffective efforts motivating me to run. Naturally this work landed me front and center in the drug epidemic and homeless crisis. We need a new approach.

Please explain how your campaign will address donations from utilities, fossil fuel companies, and corporate PACs? At this time this has not been something that has come up. What are your most significant accomplishments either as an individual, member of a group, or elected official on environment and climate change?

Good soil and thriving green spaces are key to offsetting greenhouse gasses. I have led We Heart Seattle over the past four years where we restored the entire city of Seattle's green spaces. While this may seem less big picture it was something I did with little cost to restore areas and equally important to display the utter decimation of unsanctioned camping and illegal dumping has had on natural resources.
